**LOCAL RISK FACTOR: HIGH** 

**UNALASKA COVID-19 CASE COUNT:** Today we report 8 new cases, 3 which are industry-related and 5 who are household members of other people who had positive tests for the virus.

Moving forward, we plan to provide the above level of detail for the local case count, so long as it is sustainable for our health care providers and contact tracing teams to report. For cases related to Industry or Travel, we will supply further information, such as date of arrival, if that case had the potential of impacting other people.

## **Definitions:**

- COVID-19 Tests Performed Locally: COVID tests completed by clinic staff (IFHS, APIA)
- <u>Cumulative Positive Persons Tested Locally</u>: Persons receiving positive tests; one person with multiple positive tests is counted once
- Current Active Cases: Persons with positive tests who have not been released from isolation
- <u>Industry Related</u>: Persons employed at local seafood processing facilities, or on vessels in port
- Travel Related: Persons who likely acquired the virus outside Unalaska during recent travel
- <u>Community Acquired</u>: Persons whose acquisition of the virus cannot be directly linked to travel or household exposure, or incoming industry individuals in a quarantined status
- Household Members: Household members of persons testing positive, who likely acquired the virus within the household

**TESTING WASTEWATER FOR COVID-19:** As reported on November 30, Unalaska's Wastewater Lab is testing wastewater for COVID-19. Wastewater surveillance has been shown to forecast clinical detection of the virus that causes COVID-19. For the first time since testing began in July, samples from December 2 & 3 tested positive for the virus. At the time of this testing, there were active cases of the virus on the island, so it is good to know the testing works, and can detect the virus, even with relatively few cases on the island.

**GOVERNOR TO ISSUE NEW EMERGENCY DECLARATION:** Governor Dunleavy announced he will issue another 30-day COVID-19 Public Health Disaster Emergency Declaration for the State of Alaska, effective December 16, 2020 through January 15, 2021. "While the first shipment of the COVID-19 vaccine is expected to arrive in Alaska any day now, the threat posed by the virus is still with us," said Governor Dunleavy. "We can see the light at the end of the tunnel - but the next 30 days are crucial to advance therapeutic treatments and the vaccination plan so we can defeat this virus and begin returning to normal." The declaration will be formally issued by Monday, December 14, 2020.
