COVID-19 AND CREW OF THE AMERICAN DYNASTY: Over the past few days there has been a significant amount of press around a COVID-19 outbreak on a trawler, the *American Dynasty*, from the Washington State area. The *American Dynasty* arrived in port in Bellingham, Washington on Thursday, May 28 after 15 days at sea, because of a symptomatic crew member. The symptomatic crew member tested positive for COVID-19. The remaining 123 crew members were tested and 85 have tested positive thus far, with several tests still pending. The *American Dynasty* was last in Unalaska / Dutch Harbor in March, so this outbreak poses no threat to our community. It's also important to understand that mandates for industry quarantines and testing are different between Washington and Alaska. In Washington, the process for clearing a crew member to board a vessel requires 5 days quarantine with one COVID test (viral RNA) and antibody testing. In Alaska, the process requires 14 days quarantine plus three COVID tests (viral RNA). The more stringent requirements in Alaska may further reduce the spread of COVID-19 to rural Alaskan communities, which are less likely to have access to hospital-based care that may be required.
