# City of Unalaska Legislative Report 3/12/23

This week the legislature still has not picked up much steam. Several more hearings were held on the Governors bills related to carbon storage and carbon offset in addition to bills related to temporary professional licensing, increases to the Base Student Allocation (BSA) and repealing the Certificate of Need (CON) for medical facilities.

House Joint Resolution 9 was introduced this week, the proposed constitutional amendment would combine the Permanent Fund Principal and the Permanent Fund Earnings Reserve Account into a single constitutionally protected account. Under this proposed amendment, the Legislature would be allowed to appropriate each year a maximum of five percent (5%) of the market value of that new constitutionally safeguarded account as calculated over the first five of the preceding six fiscal years.

It looks like the Biden Administration is close to making a final decision about the Willow Project—an oil and gas development project in the National Petroleum Reserve that promises thousands of jobs for Alaskans and years of critically needed economic growth for Alaska. This would demonstrate a commitment to responsible energy development and a recognition of the importance of projects like Willow to the country's future.

A pay raise for Alaska's executive branch leaders was unanimously rejected by the legislative branch, with some lawmakers saying paychecks for both branches should be considered. Had it not been rejected, the recommendation would have raised the the governor's salary from the current \$145,000 per year to \$176,000, based on a 2% annual increase since the last raise in 2011. Similar increases would raise the lieutenant governor's salary to about \$140,000 and department commissioners — whose last increase was in 2015 — to \$168,000. The commission recommended no changes to legislative pay, which has remained the same since 2010.

#### **Interesting read:**

Alaska's working-age population peaked 10 years ago, and the rate of loss since then has been nearly the highest among all U.S. states, according to the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development. The details are described in the lead article in the March issue of Alaska Economic Trends, the monthly magazine produced by the department's research and analysis section.

The number of Alaskans between 18 and 64 years old reached its peak in 2013 at 479,000 but by 2022 had fallen to 449,000, according to the article. Alaska's 5.4% loss in working-age adults from 2013 to 2021 is eclipsed only by the 8% loss in West Virginia and the 6% loss in Wyoming.



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There are three reasons for Alaska's decline, according to the article: outmigration, the aging nature of Alaska's population and the large number of <u>deaths during the COVID-19 pandemic.</u> Alaska has had 10 consecutive years of more people leaving the state than moving into it, the longest stretch since such records began after World War II.
