City of Unalaska Legislative Report 3/26/23

We are past the halfway mark and based on the news this week the Legislature will have to be very creative to balance the budget while attempting to meet the many needs of the State.

The Department of Revenue (DOR) released its annual **Spring Revenue Forecast** last week, showing lower than anticipated revenues largely associated with a decline in oil prices. In December, DOR projected an oil price of \$88.45 and \$81.00 a barrel for the FY2023 (current) and FY2024 (upcoming) fiscal years. This equates to unrestricted general fund revenue of \$7.2 billion and \$6.9 billion, respectively.

This new forecast estimates that prices will be \$85.25 for FY2023 and \$73.00 for FY2024 — equating to a loss of revenue of \$246 million and \$679 million respectively. It remains to be seen how the Legislature will address the issue.

A revised estimate by Alaska Department of Revenue projects that the massive Willow oil project will start paying off to the state treasury by 2030, years earlier than past analyses.

The new <u>analysis</u> presents a more positive picture for state revenues than did an <u>analysis</u> <u>issued by the department</u> three weeks ago. But the revised calculations find that rather than being \$1 billion in the hole in the first 10 years of Willow's life, the state will more than break even before the end of the first decade, according to testimony to the Senate and House Finance Committees.

Drawing plenty of propaganda last week was the report originally issued by the State Officer Compensation Commission which recommended salary increases for the Governor, Lt. Governor, and executive department heads. Subsequently, the legislature unanimously rejected the commission's recommended pay increases. Then, the Governor replaced all members of the commission, and the new commission rapidly voted to amend the report to include large legislative pay raises, at which point the governor then vetoed <u>SB 86</u> giving the legislature until March 25 to override the veto or the executive and legislative pay increases would be automatically adopted. After this week, it seems unlikely that the legislature has the votes to override the Governor's veto.



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The Legislature is preparing to examine two new tax proposals after the state revenue forecast showed significant long-term budget deficits even with a reduced Permanent Fund dividend.

One proposal, introduced Friday by Sen. Bill Wielechowski, would cut a popular oil production tax credit and close a loophole in the state's corporate income tax. The second proposal, expected as soon as Monday from Rep. Ben Carpenter, would create a state sales tax.

The sales tax bill has already been scheduled for a hearing Wednesday night in the House Ways and Means Committee, which Carpenter chairs. The oil tax bill has been scheduled for a hearing Friday in the Senate Finance Committee.

Public testimony was heard on several bills this week, the topics drawing the most attention from the public included education funding, defined benefits and the operating budget.
