

# <u>City of Unalaska Legislative Report</u> 3/6/23

The Senate Majority rolled out its new public employee pension bill last Wednesday. **SB 88** is sponsored by Senator Giessel and has nine cosponsors. The bill basically restores a Defined Benefit pension for public employees. The new bill requires employees to contribute more (8 percent of pay in the first year) than under the current Defined Contributions, or 401(k)-type plan. Also, medical benefits for active and retired employees are similar to current benefits and that are not particularly generous. These provisions were included by the sponsors to allay fears that restoration of Defined Benefits would increase long-term liability.

The Federal decision on Willow oil project is expected this week from the Department of Interior. There has been a full court press in DC over the last few weeks in support of the project.

The governor's suite of carbon-related legislation (also called carbon capture, utilization and storage) continues its progress through the legislature. After several hearings in House Resources last week, it is likely that HB 50 (carbon storage) will move out of that committee this week. On the senate side, hearings on the subject begin in the Resources Committee, where agency representatives and experts will be on the receiving end of many questions related to the proposed program.

The House Ways and Means committee is scheduled to discuss the various legislation designed to establish a more forceful state spending cap. Members will hear more about HJR 2, which calls for a constitutional amendment to limit spending, and HB 38, which sets an appropriation limit.

The Alaska state legislature has taken an important step to protect the state's fisheries and support the trolling industry, passing House Joint Resolution 5 with unanimous support from both the majority and minority caucuses. The resolution urges the United States Secretary of Commerce and other state and federal agencies to defend Alaska's fisheries, which are critical to the region's economy and support a wide variety of fishing industry-related jobs.

Sources in the capitol say Governor Dunleavy will introduce new education bills this week including funding measures. It's not yet known what the proposals are but there is speculation that an adjustment to the Base Student Allocation (BSA) may be included,



but one tied to some form of performance measure. The BSA allocation hasn't been adjusted since 2017. A link to performance has been a big part of the conversation.
