

City of Unalaska Legislative Report 3/31/24

Last week was light on general legislation due to the Legislature taking a long weekend for the Easter Holiday.

Despite the recent veto of a comprehensive education bill by the governor, rural schools in Alaska are set to benefit from improved internet speeds next year. Just two days before the federal funding grant deadline, state lawmakers passed a bill enabling rural schools to apply for grants that would allow them to access internet speeds of up to 100 megabits per second, a significant increase from the current maximum speed. Governor Dunleavy signed House Bill 193 into law on Friday, ensuring this access for rural schools.

House Finance Committee members are gearing up to review in the range of 100 amendments to the latest version of the operating budget. Last week, when the House Finance Committee unveiled the draft budget, it included a proposed dividend of \$2,272 which would leave the state with a surplus of \$150 million. A full statutory dividend payout would result in over a billion dollars in deficit spending. To maintain a balanced budget, the House Finance Committee opted for a 50-50 payout formula, which represents the third-largest dividend in Alaska's history.

The Senate Finance Committee members have raised concerns over budget constraints, highlighting that there is only about \$150 million remaining for the state's capital or construction budget. This limitation implies that numerous desired projects may not receive funding.

Various spending items are still pending decisions, such as extending senior benefits, estimated at around \$23 million, providing state "matching" funds amounting to \$206.5 million for a federal grant designated for upgrading the Southcentral Alaska power transmission system, allocating funds for potential summer fire-fighting costs, covering expenses related to new bills requiring adjustments to existing state agency programs, and addressing other unresolved spending priorities.



Furthermore, the state has received a letter from the federal government indicating a possible need to repay up to \$30 million in federal COVID-relief grants, adding to the financial challenges faced by Alaska's budget planning.

Federal officials granted approval for the majority of Alaska's four-year Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). However, they decided to exclude six projects from the program. Yet hundreds of projects are scheduled for implementation in the upcoming years, while much of this is great news, the Department still has some work to do. You can read more here.

The six exclusions identified by the Federal Highway Administration:

- \$500,000 for planning to improve passenger rail service to places between Fairbanks and Seward, including Anchorage, Whittier, Wasilla, Talkeetna, Denali National Park and Nenana;
- \$7.1 million to replace a bridge on Aurora Drive in Fairbanks over Noyes Slough;
- \$68.7 million for part of the Port of Alaska project in Anchorage;
- \$407,284 for <u>a program</u> intended to plan for disaster recovery;
- The state's plan to use \$19.8 million in existing ferry ticket sales to match federal grants for ferry-related projects;
- and \$23.2 million for bridge and tunnel inspections.

The House companion is HB 84 by Rep.Sumner. That bill is in the House C&RA committee also, but since the senate bill came first it is now the primary vehicle. Both bills have bipartisan cosponsors and Rep. McCabe developed a definition in the House committee, now in SB 77 as an amendment, of what constitutes "blight." Witnesses in hearings said the term needs definition because without it municipalities will set differing standards to the disadvantage of property owners. A city or borough would be able to tax properties that it deems "blighted."
