# <u>City of Unalaska Legislative Report</u> <u>3/3/24</u>

Last week started off with good news for education funding in the state, but quickly turned less conclusive.

- The Senate <u>voted</u> to concur with the House <u>changes</u> to the state's education bill.
- Governor Dunleavy is <u>threatening</u> to veto it if teacher recruitment and retention bonuses and charter school provisions are not included.
- He has until March 14 to act on the bill before it becomes law.
- If the governor vetoes the bill, the legislature has 5 days to meet in joint session to override.
- Of note, <u>Senate Bill 97</u>, the Governor's teacher recruitment and retention bill has a hearing <u>scheduled</u> in the Senate Education committee next week.

U.S. Congressman Mary Peltola gave her annual address to the legislature.

- She spent a lot of time during her remarks, during the Q&A with legislators and during her press availability talking about <u>her efforts</u> and the recent announcement by the Federal Trade Commission that is <u>suing</u> to stop a proposed Kroeger-Albertson Merger.
- At issue outlined in an earlier <u>letter</u> from Senators Murkowski and Sullivan is Alaskans' access to food and the high prices they pay for groceries.
- She touted the Conoco-Philips Willow project and DOI efforts to restrict development in the NPR-A
- She touched on her work toward <u>Alaska's Grid Resilience and Innovation Partner-</u> ships program award, and implored legislators to pass the required funding match.
- Peltola also spoke to the issue of state <u>outmigration</u> and <u>announced</u> she will convene a summit of Alaskans to study the issue, but her DC office could offer no further details.

The State Department of Transportation gave both the House and Senate Finance Committees **briefings** on the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) recently <u>rejected</u> by the Federal Highway Administration, threatening over \$5 billion dollars in highway projects and thousands of jobs.

- At the briefing, DOT Commissioner, Ryan Anderson told legislators his team has been working seven days a week and would re-submit its plan on Friday.
- The commissioner also said he was looking into a rolling (annual) STIP similar to efforts in other <u>states</u>, so the department doesn't find itself in the same position again.

The Legislative Finance Division gave the Senate Finance Committee an <u>update</u> on the fall revenue forecast projection of \$6.5 Billion dollars, which would leave a potential deficit of <u>\$1 Billion dollars</u>.

• The governor plans to fill with gap with the Statutory Budget Reserve and the Constitutional Budget Reserve.



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- Senate Finance Co-Chairman, Bert Stedman offered that it looks like the capital budget is in peril and that the committee has some work to do.
- The spring revenue forecast is due March 15.

Local governments and school districts would be able to join the state's health insurance program.

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HB 63 - is suggested to save \$433,000 per year by repealing the Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission. HB 63 will return jurisdiction over appeals of Workers' Compensation Board decisions to the Superior Court. Currently the Appeals Commission handles these cases, and their decisions can be appealed to the Supreme Court.

This bill would include the following to the properties exempt from general taxation:

A parking lot owned by an organization incorporated under state law that is exempt from taxation and used for parking or another use as long as the parking or other use is permitted without charge;

Real and personal property of a store operated by an organization incorporated under state law that is exempt from taxation under 26 U.S.C. 501(c) if the store deals exclusively in donated inventory that is distributed without cost as part of a program to provide needy persons with food, shelter, clothing, or health care without charge or sells merchandise below market value to support a literacy program or a program to provide needy persons with food, shelter, clothing, or health care without charge.

A borough may not levy or collect a sales or use tax on the transfer of real property. This subsection applies to home rule and general law municipalities.



HB 142 levies a 2% sales tax on the purchase or lease of personal property, and the sale services.

There are several exemptions, including: financial and lending services; sales to or from the US or State Government; municipalities are exempt\*except for sales by utilities; wages and services between employers and employees and services contracted within a company/business are exempt as well. Transactions between business partners or holders of joint interests are exempt, as well as, the sale, lease and/or construction of real property (more exemptions can be found in the key provisions.)

This bill authorizes entering into the "Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement" or SSUTA. SSUTA is used by 44 states and helps to "simplify and make more uniform the sales and use tax collection and administration for retailers and states." In addition to administrative services the program assists remote sellers selling over the internet and by mail to collect taxes.

Section 43.44.250 (page 12) the bill provides that the revenue generated by the sales tax would be put into the general fund, but that the legislature may appropriate half to municipalities.

The House companion is HB 84 by Rep.Sumner. That bill is in the House C&RA committee also, but since the senate bill came first it is now the primary vehicle. Both bills have bipartisan cosponsors and Rep. McCabe developed a definition in the House committee, now in SB 77 as an amendment, of what constitutes "blight." Witnesses in hearings said the term needs definition because without it municipalities will set differing standards to the disadvantage of property owners. A city or borough would be able to tax properties that it deems "blighted."
