# City of Unalaska Legislative Report 4/14/24

The Senate and House met the negotiated deadline for exchanging the capital and operation budgets late Friday evening. However, significant discrepancy exists between the two bodies in terms of their allocation and prioritization of revenues. This substantial gap, amounting to hundreds of millions of dollars, suggests differing perspectives on how best to allocate current and future resources to address the needs and priorities of the state.

The Office of Management and Budget introduced an amendment package that includes updates to the DOT Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). These revisions were necessary to bring the STIP in compliance with federal requirements and have now received approval. The Senate's capital budget incorporates these changes, which may have contributed to the committee's decision to push the bill to the last minute.

Here are some initial highlights of the capital budget:

- The balance of the Alaska Liquified Natural Gas Project Fund is being redeployed for the cost of shutting down the Alaska Gasline Development Corporation. The House cut the salaries of the corporation's two highest-paid executives; this action in the Senate would mothball the organization entirely.
- \$10 million of cruise ship head taxes for port electrification projects to reduce cruise ship emissions while they are docked.
- The bill includes roughly \$90 million of named-recipient and municipal grants. Named-recipient grants are most used to fund a community or organization to complete a special project. They are frequently assigned based on prioritizations made by the capital budget chair and senators or representatives from the impacted district. Often, very little information is given about these projects during the legislative process, and there is minimal scope beyond a project title to guide the public in understanding how the money will be spent. A couple of examples from the bill include:
  - \$7.5 million to SeaShare to complete a seafood security and processing sector resiliency project.
  - \$300,000 to the Bethel Family Clinic for equipment to complete a dental expansion.
  - o \$750,000 to Habitat for Humanity to develop parcels for new multi-unit homes.
  - o \$1 million to Anchorage for replacement of the Starner St. Bridge.



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- \$36.2 million for major maintenance grants to school districts.
- \$21.6 million for phase one of the replacement of the Nelson Island school.
- \$5 million increase to weatherization grants through the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation.
- \$228,000 Captain's Bay Road CTP award

All in, the state House and Senate planned to spend \$550 million in state dollars on capital projects. When federal funding is included, the capital budget nears \$4 billion.

There continues to be some disagreement between the House and Senate on the sustainability of the budget that passed the House. The Senate argues that there are outstanding issues that erase the surplus that the House currently shows on paper. These issues include fiscal notes, wildfire suppression, federal requirements for education funding, and potential match for energy grants.

Despite spending six weeks on the House calendar, House Joint Resolution 7, sponsored by Rep. Ben Carpenter which aimed to enshrine the Permanent Fund dividend in the constitution as an annual payout without specifying the formula or revenue source fell short of advancing, lacking the necessary 27 votes for passage, with only 22 yes votes.

The dialogue and exchanges during the debate process sheds light on the deep divisions within the House majority and underscores the challenges they may encounter during the final budget vote.

The House Finance Committee took up two bills related to the Cook Inlet natural gas shortage last week. HB 223, reducing the state royalty on new gas production, and HB 387, tax incentives to move a second "jack up" rig to the Inlet, were both held in committee. A jack-up rig is a specialized drill rig used for offshore exploration drilling. One jack-up rig now in the Inlet is fully committed, and a second rig is needed to drill new gas wells.

Additionally, royalty reduction in HB 223 or HB 393 are seen as the quickest way to secure new production of natural gas in time to offset a predicted decline, at least partly, in gas supplies starting in 2027. There are proven undeveloped gas reserves in the Kitchen Lights field where complex overriding royalties to equity partners are complicating the financing of new wells. Reducing the state royalty is seen as a quick solution, at least for the short term.

This week will be focused on each body adding their edits to the operating and capital budgets to send back to the originator. If the changes are not accepted, both bodies will appoint members to serve on the conference committee to hash out the differences. There remains optimism for adjournment on or around May 12<sup>th</sup>.

The House companion is HB 84 by Rep.Sumner. That bill is in the House C&RA committee also, but since the senate bill came first it is now the primary vehicle. Both bills have bipartisan cosponsors and Rep. McCabe developed a definition in the House committee, now in SB 77 as an amendment, of what constitutes "blight." Witnesses in hearings said the term needs definition because without it municipalities will set differing standards to the disadvantage of property owners. A city or borough would be able to tax properties that it deems "blighted."
