

<u>City of Unalaska Legislative Report</u> <u>4/7/24</u>

The House Finance Committee faced a challenging and thorough process in debating the amendments to the FY25 operating budget. With a significant number of formal amendments, conceptual amendments, and extensive discussions, HB 268 was passed out of committee on Friday.

Out of the 100 amendments that were considered, 37 were approved by the committee. These approved amendments are projected to result in an Unrestricted General Fund (UGF) cost of \$56.2 million in FY25 and \$15 million in FY24. It's important to note that these figures are preliminary, as they do not account for the potential impact of conceptual amendments and reconsiderations. Once the bill is officially moved from the committee, Legislative Finance will be tasked with producing accurate reports detailing all the actions taken by the committee regarding the amendments to the budget. These reports will provide a comprehensive overview of the financial implications and changes introduced through the approved amendments.

The procedural requirement for the bill to sit for 24 hours on members' desks before further action can be taken poses a logistical challenge in meeting the deadline for exchanging budgets with the Senate by April 12.

The upcoming House floor debates on the budget, with a potential new round of amendments, may further delay the process if they require significant time for discussion and voting. If the House majority relies on minority votes to pass the budget and struggles to secure the necessary 21 votes, this could introduce additional complexities and uncertainties into the budget approval process.

The Senate Finance Committee will be spending this week working through finance subcommittee close outs and the Capital Budget.

There was a major focus on energy last week, with over a dozen energy bills before the Legislature highlighting a diverse range of energy-related issues. These bills can be broadly categorized into four main categories based on their intended objectives, boosting Cook Inlet gas production, modernizing the railbelt electrical grid, increasing renewable energy production, regulating the storage of natural gas. By addressing these distinct aspects of energy policy, the Legislature is attempting to foster a comprehensive and balanced approach to energy management, promoting innovation, sustainability, and resilience in Alaska's energy sector. The problem may be that there are too many moving parts which often leads to unintended consequences or bill passage becomes impossible.

Things will begin moving quickly after this week, there is an anticipated Sine Die date of May 12th. Keep your fingers crossed.

Local governments and school districts would be able to join the state's health insurance program.

HB 63 - is suggested to save \$433,000 per year by repealing the Alaska Workers' Compensation Appeals Commission. HB 63 will return jurisdiction over appeals of Workers' Compensation Board decisions to the Superior Court. Currently the Appeals Commission handles these cases, and their decisions can be appealed to the Supreme Court.

Real and personal property of a store operated by an organization incorporated under state law that is exempt from taxation under 26 U.S.C. 501(c) if the store deals exclusively in donated inventory that is distributed without cost as part of a program to provide needy persons with food, shelter, clothing, or health care without charge or sells merchandise below market value to support a literacy program or a program to provide needy persons with food, shelter, clothing, or health care without charge.

The House companion is HB 84 by Rep.Sumner. That bill is in the House C&RA committee also, but since the senate bill came first it is now the primary vehicle. Both bills have bipartisan cosponsors and Rep. McCabe developed a definition in the House committee, now in SB 77 as



an amendment, of what constitutes "blight." Witnesses in hearings said the term needs definition because without it municipalities will set differing standards to the disadvantage of property owners. A city or borough would be able to tax properties that it deems "blighted."
